Qualifications

- 1) Minimum education requirement is a High School diploma or equivalent, and
- 2) Minimum experience requirement is 6 months of NCCT-qualifying postsecondary teaching experience, and
- 3) CPI application form must be completed and signed, and all required documentation must be submitted with the application (and approved) before testing is allowed.



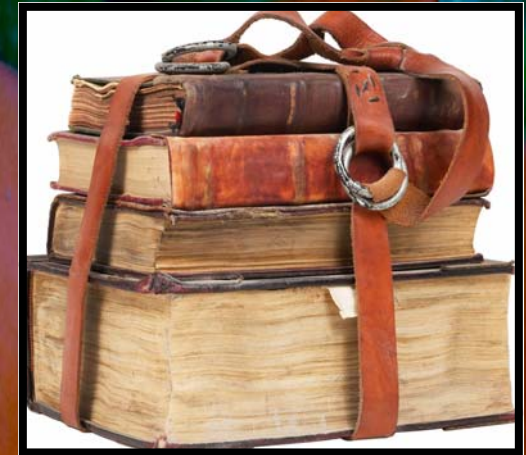

Who should take the CPI exam ?

The Certified Postsecondary Instructor exam determines whether teachers can teach, regardless of their subject matter expertise. For example, a chemist may be an expert in the lab, but he or she may not possess the skills needed to teach someone else to become a chemist. That is because “teaching” skills are different from the skills needed to become a chemist. This test evaluates whether a person has specific teaching skills for the adult classroom.

Who can benefit?

Instructors for non-profit or proprietary schools, career or community colleges, or vocational programs at the post-secondary level can benefit from this credential. When teachers are successful, students are successful, and schools are successful!
